

Dudley Voices for Choice Self Advocacy



Dudley Voices for Choice are the self advocacy group for people with learning disabilities and/or autism who live in the Dudley borough.



The group was started over ten years ago so that people could have a say in how their services were run and changed in Dudley. DVC said what they would like made better.



We are part of the Dudley learning disability partnership board and go to all of the meetings. We make sure people with a learning disability are listened to.



We are members of local community groups. We represent people with learning disabilities and autism at the meetings.



We talk about things that are important to us.



We attend the regional learning disability board meetings. This is where all self advocacy groups from the West Midlands meet to share their information.



All of our information is in easy read. We use pictures and symbols to help to explain what we are saying. All of our work is checked by the members to make sure it is clear and easy to understand.



We have a team of people who do peer review services. This means that they look at services in the Dudley borough and write a report to help the services get better.



We deliver training to people who want to know more about living with a learning disability and/or autism. Our experts talk about many things. The training is only delivered by people who have experience and live with a learning disability everyday.
